




Black Brother, Black Brother by Jewell Parker Rhodes


Ghost Boys by Jewell Parker Rhodes




New Kid by Jerry Craft




Stella By Starlight by Sharon Draper


A Good Kind of Trouble by Lisa Moore Ramée




Midnight Without a Moon by Linda Williams Jackson




How High the Moon by Karyn Parsons




Hush by Jacqueline Woodson




The Silence of Our Friends by Mark Long & Jim Demonakos, art by Nate Powell


Monster by Walter Dean Myers








Anger is a Gift by Mark Oshiro




The Hate U Give by Angie Thomas

The uneasy balance between these worlds is shattered when Starr witnesses the fatal shooting of her childhood best friend Khalil at the hands of a police officer. Khalil was unarmed. Soon afterward, his death is a national headline. What everyone wants to know is: what really went down that night? And the only person alive who can answer that is Starr. But what Starr does or does not say could upend her community. It could also endanger her life.






Watch Us Rise by Renée Watson and Ellen Hagan




Black Enough: Stories of Being Young and Black in America edited by Ibi Zoboi


Dear Martin by Nic Stone




This Book is Anti-Racist by Tiffany Jewell and Aurelia Durand
